



Preface.

It is with great pleasure and indeed honour that we welcome you to this, the first of our online auction events. The sale is split into four major categories.

Category I. The first, and most substantial segment with over 300 individual lots, is our 18th century provincial tokens section. Here, we cover specialist material from across Great Britain and Ireland, by county and location, as referenced by Dalton & Hamer, visiting as many locations as possible along the way.

In England, we have a selection of Skidmore's Globe pennies which journeys across many places, in particular Cambridge. From the same county, we exhibit a wonderful James Burleigh D&H 9a penny, a particularly rare type in this condition. Essex too is strongly represented with some superb examples from Woodford. Gloucester offers a range of copper, bronze, and white metal varieties with provenance from Dalton and the Mysterious Mr B. Newent includes a scintillating D&H 64 as well as a variety with a new unpublished edge. A couple of penny bulls from Hereford takes cross-country with some dazzling ha'penny and farthing varieties in Hertfordshire. Lancaster imitations have us settling there for a while before stopping in Liverpool with a new variety - having unpublished obverse, reverse and new edge! An overnight stay is required in Middlesex, starting with the rare D&H 2bis sixpence. Lutwyche, Prattent and Skidmore offers much of the early material whilst Rebello and Hancock starts off the halfpennies in style. Five Robert Orchard varieties has us moving to the Strand for Pidcock's exhibition before hopping to High Holborn and Hyde Park to visit Skidmore's Foundry. Thomas Spence puts halt to our gallivanting for some time to discuss his Plan and introduce us to a native American friend, Lord Gordon and Daniel Mendoza, the latter keeping company with a couple of rascals, but I think Spence would take them both! Before dismissing any accountability for a few End of Pain varieties, even the brass, he makes us wave goodbye to his dog, a stag and even a snail. "So long you Fools", he cries as we end our tour of London with a range of attractive farthings. Some classic Norfolk and Yarmouth variants, including a Westwood's half-halfpenny, one of several of this denomination that can be found dotted throughout the sale. Jeremiah Spence shows us a Highlander and then a boat drifting peacefully on the Coaly Tyne. Somerset has a first appearance of the Asylum edge, over-struck by a D&H 5 in this instance and makes a further five appearances throughout the sale. Milton introduces us to James Conder with the same dies being struck from his penny and halfpenny. An extremely rare Greathead's Petition, and some Monster Seditions, start the trip through Warwickshire. Whilst Birmingham and Coventry buildings have been fairly busy in the marketplace recently, we offer a few uncommon variants, including those in brass along with a copper Otley from Birmingham, then followed by blooming silver-proof Coventry specimen. Some Handel mules as well as another Mr B appearance finishes off our Midlands trip, and then onto York, waving to a couple of Hagley's along the way. Yorkshire greets us with a couple of encapsulated varieties from Benjamin Smith and Samuel Birchall, both passing the MS 66 test. One of the highlights is a Sheffield D&H 61, overstruck on a Macclesfield halfpenny, and in mint state. 200 lots down.

A journey across the Irish sea offers many unpublished Camac, Kyan and Camac varieties; the first part in a series of forthcoming sections in our future sales. A rare appearance of a King's County D&H 4 then leads us to Munster where a possibly unique D&H 7b overstrike variety from the Dalton collection is complimented beautifully by a "Fat Man" mule, previously of MS 66 RB encapsulation. Some Wexford and Wicklow varieties end our trip to the Emerald Isle. Next stop, Wales. A small but important offering from Anglesey includes a D penny; Boulton's D&H 380 halfpenny; along with some Skidmore farthings. Scotland offers almost 50 lots, beginning with some choice Dundee halfpenny and farthing varieties. Robert Boog brings us the rare bronzed Kirkaldy penny whilst a few Glasgow mules are some of many pieces previously from the Cokayne cabinet. Many rare Lanarkshire and Linlithgowshire farthings move us onto Lothian to an extremely rare Edinburgh D&H 11, once belonging to James Atkins. A brief stop at Campbell's Snuff Shop displays five different varieties which concludes with a diverse variety of farthings, many rare.

Those that are familiar with our fixed price lists will already be acquainted with our Extended Universe. This section offers mistrikes, double-strikes and curios from the 18th century series. We also cover countermarked varieties, in particular a group of Spence countermarks, found on various different host coins and planchets. Brining a close to the section and the overall category, are a number of engraved tokens, some showing incredible workmanship.

Category II. We have entitled this category "Inferior Issue the 18th Century" and is split between the Evasion series, with over 100 lots, alongside Georgian non-regal counterfeit halfpennies and farthings. In the first instance, we look at crossover issues, those that have place in both Dalton & Hamer as well as the Evasion series, documented by Atkins and, more comprehensively, by Cobwright. With almost 50 varieties, we link many dies, including two of the very few Evasion varieties which have an edge device, in particular Cobwright G0860 / V0010,

with the Glorious Pellew obverse coupled with the British Tars (Hampshire D&H 14) reverse. Pellew appears again with a Camac Hibernia reverse, likely the only known Camac variety not to be included by Dalton & Hamer. Further along, we have the first part of a group of Evasions that were purchased from Baldwins, representing a good portion of the more crude and scarcer types. Some of the highlights of the section includes an Auctori Plebis uniface halfpenny, Cobwright A0035 / Blank, as well as an unpublished Thomas Hardy halfpenny, both extremely rare. The second part offers a selection of Georgian counterfeit varieties, notably examples from the *Big Bird* and *Simian* families, alongside other crude and strange imitations, including some delightful brockages.

Category III. We have something for everyone in our third category which offers small offerings from a wide range of token genres. Here, we have over a hundred further lots to enjoy, together with a collection of calendar medals and British medallions from various properties. An unpublished 1669 Lancashire halfpenny is highlighted in our 17th century section along with issues from other locations. At the turn of the 19th century, there are many significant pieces on offer. Firstly, we have Sir Edward Thomason's gilt-proof penny, brilliant and extremely rare. One of the highlights of the entire auction sits at lot 472 - previously described as by far the most important Welsh 19th century token - the Wyon's Landore British Copper Company pattern penny. A gift from the engraver bestowed directly to Sir George Chetwynd, the only variety of its kind and unique. Some further attractive copper offerings complete the early part of this century, featuring a final appearance from our acquaintance, Mr B. Some silver tokens provide a suitable distraction before our attention moves to later in the century with a group of various Irish pub tokens, as listed by Rice and Todd. An unpublished variety of John Hipwell makes an appearance, a 5-shilling piece - a denomination not recorded by Woodside. Our medallic segments offer pieces dating from 1650's through to the 1850's and are then followed by a wonderful one-owner collection of calendar medals which includes a rather unique variety fashioned from a Charles III Spanish reales. A small offering of tickets and theatre passes brings the section to a close but not before several larger group lots of refreshment, cooperative, market, communion, and countermarked tokens.

Category IV. Our concluding segment brings us offerings from across the globe. We start with a continuation from previous themes with crossover tokens that have one foot placed either side of the pond. A few Talbot, Allum and Lee mules have us moving onto Kentucky and the Franklin Mint before we stay for several George Washington varieties. A rare Lancashire D&H 116 starts us off followed by a choice Middlesex D&H 243 Liberty and Security penny which has our Asylum edge making its final appearance. A fascinating love token engraved over a Middlesex 1051 leaves an impression before an offering of US colonial coppers end that specific period of early America. Next up is a comprehensive grouping of historical tokens, as issued by Augustus B. Sage, from around the 1860's, providing a tour across various US landmarks.

An Australian mule penny, extremely rare, issued by Australia's first token maker, begins our worldwide voyage. Then, a rare New Zealand halfpenny from Hobart moves us to the Middle East, with some rare issues from Breisch & Company and a paras from Beirut. From there, we go island hopping around the West Indies, St. Lucia, and the British Virgin Islands. To end the auction, we have a selection of medals which starts off with a fascinating scouting medal from Shanghai, awarded to an American Christian missionary, who was trapped in China following the Japanese invasion c.1920. Medallions from mostly France, Switzerland and Germany brings our inaugural sale to its closure.

We hope you enjoy the contents of the sale as much as we have putting it all together. Our ambition was to create a platform that offers something bespoke that caters specifically to the token collector. We hope that through this medium, we can continue to fulfil the collecting needs of the community and bring you regular sales alongside offering more material in our online store. At a time when our relatively small population of collectors are often left wanting or overlooked by major auction houses, we're passionate about delivering a solution and embedding the certainty that token-coinage is as important to us as it is to you. With huge gratitude, we thank you for your commitment and keeping us company on the journey so far and greet those that we meet now for the first time, with open arms.

Reverse: The wings of the smaller Liver bird just beyond the first limb of the C and the head just left of the centre of Æ. The bulrushes extend to the first limb of the O and level with the first limb of B on the left. The right bulrushes reach almost to the last limb of the A and just beyond the I of OTIA. The edge unseen on any published token in the entire 18th century series: **PAYABLE AT THE WAREHOUSE LONDON OR LIVERPOOL**. One theory could be that both these edges are a concatenation of the standard Liverpool edge and another edge which would end with LONDON OR LIVERPOOL. 

COUNTERMARKED.

Thomas Spence countermarks are an enigmatic series made by combining 27 separate punches. One punch 'AND' fractured, as can be seen in the example illustrated here and was replaced by a large ampersand '&'. The punches were identified and listed by the late Robert Thompson in his ground-breaking article, 'THE DIES OF THOMAS SPENCE' published in the BNJ of 1969. Thompson goes to great length in the article to identify genuine Spence dies, many of which are wrongly listed attributed to Spence in Dalton & Hamer. The countermarks are rare, with most on counterfeits, evasions, or Irish or Scottish halfpennies, or on lightweight halfpenny sized blanks, as the two illustrated here. Very few are struck on 1797 1ds. All but two of the punches were illustrated by Alan Judd in the Conder Token Collector's Club Journal and the illustrations can still be seen on the Thomas Spence Society website, ironically one of the two punches 'EVERY' not traced by Judd, appears on one of the halfpennies listed below.

This piece is said to have been a gift of the engraver Peter Wyon to Sir George Chetwynd somewhere between 1812 and 1822. Having acquired the piece from the Norman sale at Sotheby in June 1905, this piece would remain in the Cokayne collection until finally sold at DNW in 2019. Making just its second auction appearance in 118 years, this is a rare opportunity to acquire this quintessential masterpiece. With some trifling marks, this piece is essentially as struck and of the very highest rarity – Unique.

The Banns having been published on the 3rd, 10th and 17th March 1799, John Blackett(sic) married Sarah Harris(sic), on 4th July1799, in St Dunstan and All Saints, Stepney, Tower Hamlets, they were both illiterate, signing the marriage certificate with their mark 'X'. A John Blackett, son of John and Sarah Blackett, of High Street, Aldgate, was baptised in St Botolph, Aldgate on 3rd September 1777. A John Blackett, of Church Street, was buried aged 79 on 25th February 1855, in St. Mary, Haggerston, Hackney. The couple had children including Sarah Jane, who in 1829 married the wonderfully named, William Buggins Castle, John was one of the witnesses.
