





In 2024 we will have the pleasure of auctioning off one of the most comprehensive collection of **Thomas Spence** tokens to have been formed. The **Arthur Cobwright** collection will be sold in several parts, culminating in a publication of the entire collection in a fully illustrated volume for our numismatic libraries.

Arthur Cobwright became interested in the life, writings and political ideas of Thomas Spence in the mid-1980s. At the time Spence's pieces were almost completely disregarded, as were many tokens in the 18th century series. A chance purchase of a common Spence token at the Birmingham coin fair set Cobwright on a path to a collection of some 450 pieces, which a few years ago was displayed in Spence's home city of Newcastle. Many purchases in the collection were of tokens with strong pedigrees, obtained from amongst others Baldwins, Spinks, Dix Noonan Webb, Allan Davisson and Bill McKivor. A large group of countermarked pieces were obtained from John Whitmore and are believed to have originated from Batty. The collection includes pieces from practically all the big collectors of the day. Following his recent retirement, in his 80th year, Cobwright has decided to concentrate on other pursuits and other collecting interests.
